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The Schurman Library specializes in the collection of source material and literature on American history. The library was founded in 1986 by Prof. Dr. Detlef Junker and since then has become its own independent branch of the Department of History's library at the University of Heidelberg. Thanks to the continual support of the Society to Promote the Schurman Library for American History, the library has been able to expand both its infrastructure and its resources since 1991. The Schurman Library is the only library in the SWB to offer the most important bibliography to American history, "America: History and Life". Another important index is the "National Inventory of Documentary Sources in the United States", which lists the resource materials in numerous national archives in the U.S.A. (For example, the Manuscript Division of the Library of Congress, the Presidential libraries, etc.)

Over 6000 titles were added to the Schurman Library in the last eleven years. The titles included both new releases as well as classics of historical science. Works relating to the most important events in American history (the American Revolution, the Civil War, etc.), works relating to American foreign policy, German-American relations and social history are among the works collected for the library.

Some of the most important works are an almost completed collection of "Foreign Relations of the United States" and the "papers", a collection of writings from Americans such as Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, John Samuel, John Quincy Adams, Alexander Hamilton, George Clinton, Henry Clay, John C. Calhoun, John Marshall, Daniel Webster, Abraham Lincoln, Ulysses S. Grant, Carl Schurz, Woodrow Wilson, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Dwight D. Eisenhower, John Foster Dulles, etc.

The Schurman Library also has various microfilms, most of them pertaining to the foreign policy after World War II, including the "Documents of the National Security Council", the "Minutes of Meetings of the National Security Council", the "Records of the Council on Foreign Relations", the "Confidential U.S. State Department Central Files. Germany: Foreign Affairs", etc. With the acquisition of the "William and Mary Quarterly", the most important magazine for 17th and 18th century American history, the Schurman Library was able to fill a hole in resource material in Heidelberg. Other magazines on American history include: American Historical Review, Diplomatic History, Foreign Affairs, The Historian, The Journal of American History, and the New York Review of Books.
